## III. Practical training instructions and recommendations

## IV. Independent learning and independent work.

Independent learning competence serves to support students' independent self-development and increase the effectiveness of

professional activities. Students perform independent work on their mobile devices under the guidance of a teacher in a traditional or electronic form.

It is recommended that students write essays, abstracts, tests, glossaries, and presentations on topics that are being studied independently.

# Recommended topics for independent study:

- 1. Classify the definitions of Eastern and Western thinkers on the essence of philosophy and prepare a presentation on them.
- 2. Read Seneca's "Ethical Letters to Lucilius" and prepare an essay based on these letters in which students evaluate their own lives and activities
- 3. Comparative analysis of Abu Nasr Al-Farabi and Al-Ghazali's views on philosophy (based on Al-Farabi's "Political Philosophy" and Al-Ghazali's "The Chemistry of Happiness").
- 4. Prepare an essay on the directions and essence of non-classical ontology (based on M. Heidegger's "Being and Time")
- 5. Prepare an essay on the topic "Classification of Categories in the Ontology of Aristotle, Al-Farabi and Kant" (prepare a crossword puzzle).
- 6. Prepare an essay on the methods of building a family and ideas about raising children in A. Fitrat's "Family Work".
- 7. Preparing an essay on A. Fitrat's views on the "Two Categories of Unhappy People" in his treatise "The Leader of Salvation", holding a video competition.
- 8. Comparative analysis of Avloni's article "Culture Waves" and E. Toffler's work "The Third Wave", preparing a presentation.
- 9. Preparing an essay on the topic "Information Society and Its Prospects" (based on a comparative analysis of the works of A. Toynbee, E. Toffler).
- 10. Preparing an essay on the topic "The Importance of Works of Art in the Aesthetic Perception of the World".
- 11. Preparing a video on the topic "Commonality and Differences in the Cultures of the Peoples of the World".
- 12. Preparing a crossword puzzle on "Myths of the Peoples of the World".
- 13. Analysis of the essence of J. Rumi's story "The Hunter and the Falcon" and its educational significance (based on the work "Ichindagi Ichinndadir").
- 14. Preparation of an essay on the topic "Advantages and shortcomings of modern moral education".

Purpose: Independent learning is aimed at fully covering the content of this course, expanding the theoretical knowledge acquired, and

establishing independent learning activities for students.

Form and procedure of independent education: independent work assignments are completed in the form of an educational project, presentation, case study, problem solving, information search, digest, colloquium, essay, article, abstract, etc. Completed assignments for independent study are placed in the electronic system and checked based on the anti-plagiarism program and evaluated by the subject teacher.

In this case, the uniqueness of the completed assignment should not be less than 60%, otherwise the assignment will not be accepted for assessment. The number of independent work assignments, depending on the nature of the subject, should not be less than 3 for one subject (module). Independent work assignments account for 60% of the points allocated for current and intermediate control.

### FINAL CONTROL

Purpose: The final examination is held at the end of the semester to determine the level of mastery of the student's theoretical knowledge and practical skills in the relevant subject. The final examination is held at a specified time according to the examination schedule created by the Registrar's Office on the electronic platform.

Requirements: The student must have passed the current control, intermediate control and independent learning assignments by the deadline for the final control type in the relevant subject. A student who has not passed the current control, intermediate control and independent learning assignments, as well as who has received a score in the range of "0-29.9" for these assignments and control types, is not included in the final control type. Also, a student who has missed 25 percent or more of the classroom hours allocated to a subject without a reason is excluded from this subject and is not included in the final control type and is considered not to have mastered the relevant credits in this subject. A student who has not passed or was not included in the final control type and has received a score in the range of "0-29.9" for this type of control is considered to be an academic debtor.

Final control form: The final examination in this subject will be conducted in written form. If the final examination is conducted in written form, the requirements for assessment must also be reflected.
